

A quick glance at last week's Gospel reveals the interesting development of the story: last week, we heard Peter proclaiming that Jesus was the Messiah, and being given authority as a result. This week, Peter gets it wrong: he is rebuked by the Lord because he does not understand who the Messiah is. The Messiah is the one who will give everything for his people - even his own life. To be a follower of Jesus demands an understanding and acceptance of this fact, and a willingness to take up the cross as Jesus did. Our introduction to this is the prophet Jeremiah - also persecuted for doing and saying what was right. Have a look at the Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time, where this twinning of Jeremiah and prophecy of persecution also appears.

Today's psalm is also used in Morning Prayer, part of the Divine Office of the Church faithfully prayed by millions of priests, religious and laypeople every day. We are all thirsting for God and the best way to satisfy this thirst is through a well-disciplined life of prayer.

Friday Abstinence

Abstaining from eating meat (or some other food if meat is not part of our regular diet) is the way in which Catholics throughout the world mark Friday as a day of penitence. Back in the 1980s, our Bishops' Conference decided (in accordance with their right in Canon Law) to allow us to substitute other acts of penitence but they have now decided (at their meeting in May) to restore abstinence from meat as the required act. This takes effect from Friday 16 September (the anniversary of Pope Benedict's visit to Britain last year).

Naturally, this decision has given rise to a number of questions and the Bishops' Conference has published some answers (available on the diocesan website) to assist people in understanding the purpose and practice of abstaining from meat on a Friday.

The bishops stress that the purpose of re-introducing this particular form of penitence is to enable Catholics to bear common witness to their faith through this action. As with our Lenten penances, we can link our abstinence (a form of fasting) with prayer and almsgiving, so that our efforts are part of developing our spiritual life and showing our concern for those in need.

We are urged to act prudently in situations where refusing meat on a Friday may cause offence or friction and are reminded that failure to abstain from meat on a particular Friday would not constitute a sin. The gravity of the obligation imposed by Church Law is to observe penance as a regular and necessary part of our spiritual life.
