

Twenty-Fifth Week in Ordinary Time



Something that always strikes me about the Sunday readings is how they seem to mirror life. In our second reading from the first letter of Paul to Timothy, Paul calls on us to “offer prayers, petitions, intercessions and thanksgiving especially to kings and others in authority”. There is no doubt we should follow Paul’s advice as we recall the selfless devotion and example of our late Queen Elizabeth and we should also remember her son, King Charles, who seems to have taken on the mantle of kingship with great dignity and compassion. Over the coming days and years our prayers are needed to sustain and guide him, and all those in power and authority, through the current events that have so unsettled our turbulent world.

The pastoral letters from Paul to Timothy deserve our attention in so many ways. Timothy has been placed in authority over a group of communities. He is new to this demanding task and so his friend, Paul, writes to him, giving advice over the many problems which will need wisdom and sensitivity if he is to build the church of Christ among the people. His advice is wide ranging and many of the scenarios mentioned in this letter echo the problems and challenges of our present day. Nothing really changes, only times and seasons, human life still goes on.

The pursuit of wealth to the detriment of the poor in society is the theme picked up by the Old Testament and the Gospel readings. The prophet Amos is the voice for justice and peace in his world and echoes down the centuries to our own time. The poor are still with us, prices are rising at an alarming rate and speculators are still making insane profits. We are helpless in this situation and must rely, as always on Amos’s appeal to God for justice. The steward in today’s Gospel uses his position of authority to ensure that his comfortable world continues even if he loses his status. He does this by very devious methods but, instead of anger, he receives praise from his master. A salutary lesson in the way this world places the gathering of wealth far above the needs of the poor. We are reminded today that we cannot be the slave of two masters. It is how we share the gifts we are given that will be weighed in the scales of heaven, not the profits we have made. *David Frank*

Our Lady of Walsingham



Walsingham, for centuries, has been the cradle of Marian Devotion in England. Praying to the Mother of God is an integral part of our Catholic Faith. It is one of the first ways we learn to pray as children. We turn to Mary, the Mother of Jesus for we are all her sons and daughters. Jesus's last action on earth, in his dying breath, was to entrust all people, into his Mother's Maternal care, when he said "Mother this is your son, son this is your Mother" (John 19:26-27). We pray to Mary asking for her Maternal Intercession and her loving, motherly and protective gaze upon us. It is as natural as breathing that we turn to our Heavenly Mother in times of need, crisis, tears and temptation. Jesus always hears his Mother's pleas on our behalf.

The Shrine of Our Lady at Walsingham was established around 1061 when, according to the text of the Pynson Ballad (c 1485), Richeldis de Faverches prayed that she might undertake some special work in honour of Our Lady.

The Lady Richeldis was a holy woman with a great love of the Mother of God. She asked Our Lady for a way to honour her, and it was from this desire in her heart that the events of Walsingham unfolded. Richeldis was not a visionary like the children in Lourdes and Fatima. She was a woman of faith, she pondered, meditated and prayed. In answer to her prayer, the Virgin Mary led her in spirit to Nazareth, showed her the House of the Annunciation where the Angel greeted Mary, and asked her to build a replica in Walsingham as a perpetual memorial of the Annunciation.

This Holy House was built and a religious community took charge of the foundation. Although we have very little historical material from this period, we know that with papal approval the Augustinian Canons built a Priory (c 1150). Walsingham became one of the greatest Shrines in Medieval Christendom.

Walsingham is therefore a Marian Shrine of the Incarnation, a place of pilgrimage for all who would rejoice with Mary at "the great joy of the Annunciation."

Let us, like Mary, conceive Him in our heart, that we may bring Him forth into our world, rejoicing with His Mother. Let us find help in our need here at Mary's ancient Shrine where we rejoice with the Mother of God in the truth that "The Word became flesh and lived among us."

"When England goes back to Walsingham, Our Lady will come back to England".
