So it is with joy that we stand in the country of the river Jordan, and recognise Jesus of Nazareth as the Chosen One of God, who offers himself to do God's work

Marriage Matters

We need 'power from on high': Were Jesus' fears eased when he heard the Father was 'well pleased'? He was empowered by the Holy Spirit to begin his mission: to bring to the world the Good News of God's compassion, mercy and forgiveness for our sins. By daily dialogue about concerns and issues and by seeking 'help from on high', we can overcome our fears.

Think Vocation

Here I am Lord! I come to do your will." We could do no better than put this response to today's psalm on our lips, as the first words we speak each and every day. If we want to live fruitful and fulfilling lives we will want to seek to do God's will and not just satisfy our own wishes. Through the quality of our prayer-life we will develop a personal relationship with Christ which will enable us to know deep down the direction Our Lord wants our lives to take.

26 January 2020Third Week of Ordinary Time



We will spend most of the Sundays of the coming year in the company of Saint Matthew. His Gospel (like the

others) has its own characteristics. He is writing for a Jewish audience, and so is always at pains to stress one thing: that Jesus of Nazareth was the promised Messiah. He does this by reference to Jesus' teaching and miracles, and very often by quoting the prophecies of the Old Testament to show that Jesus was their fulfilment. Today is a perfect example. "Zebulun and Naphthali" was an old name for the area round Capernaum by the side of the Lake of Galilee, a busy fishing and trading area, with many Gentile towns and settlements: it is here, rather than in the dangerous town of Nazareth, that Jesus "settles" and begins his ministry. This is where the proclamation of the Kingdom of God begins, as was foretold, and the first followers are invited to join Jesus.

Marriage Matters

God has a stake in our marriage: Today, we see two aspects of God's plan for our marriage: '... (I will make) their joy increase' (Isaiah) and 'I will make you fishers of men' (Matthew). God wants us to make our love for each other as close to Jesus' love for us as possible, that all whose lives we touch might experience how much God loves them.

Think Vocation

"Follow me and I will make you fishers of men." Perhaps Jesus chose a number of fishermen as his disciples because fishermen need to be strong, trusting and courageous. Despite their weaknesses they all proved themselves to be up to the task eventually. The Lord continues to call men to be his priests today: they also need to be tough and resilient. Let us pray that the priests of our Diocese have the courage and strength they need to lead the Church and preach the Gospel.

CARITAS SUNDAY - 26 January 2020

Caritas Sunday is the one opportunity each year for Caritas to appeal to every parish in our Diocese to support the corporal works of mercy. Formerly Catholic Children's Rescue Society (founded in 1886), Caritas (Diocese of Salford) has now expanded to respond to many areas of need in our parishes, from our work with the homeless, with children, families and the wider community, and in welcoming refugees. Caritas keeps their central admin costs to a minimum to ensure every penny donated makes a real difference. Their work with schools and parishes in the Diocese is growing in importance as we strive to be Missionary Disciples. Caritas means 'Love for Humankind.' This is the action that we are being asked to take as Missionary Disciples in our parish. Caritas (Diocese of Salford), the home charity of our Diocese, has 22 formal services and centres located around the North West.

THANK YOU! This time last year, thanks to your help, our appeal raised £29,833, which went directly to fund where the need was greatest; namely our work with children and families in our Bolton Young Parents' Home; our work with homeless at Cornerstone Day Centre; and our work with refugee education and integration. Our parish raised £675.33 in our collection - so please accept a huge thank you from Caritas!

Thanks to our supporters, in 2019 Caritas provided care and support to 13,130 unique beneficiaries. 771 people across the Diocese of Salford gave up their time to volunteer, many of whom are Caritas representatives; volunteers who help to share information from Caritas in parishes and who work with the Hope in the Future development teams to support local outreach projects.

Sunday, 26 January 2020 is Caritas Sunday. This year Caritas is asking all parishioners to support the goal of a 2020 with #NobodyLeftBehind and to help house the homeless, build stronger families and communities, and welcome refugees. The second collection after Mass and ongoing support will allow Caritas (Diocese of Salford) to continue important work in our parishes and across the Diocese.

Hope in the Future, Living the Sunday Eucharist: Seventh Installment INTRODUCTORY RITES: Penitential Act

Do you remember when, as children, your mum or dad (or grandparents) would say as you came in from an afternoon or evening of play "Make sure you wipe your feet before you come in!" Perhaps this is something you still say! In a sense that is what the "penitential act" is all about. It is part of our preparation to worship God in our liturgy - the first thing we do once we are all gathered is a spiritual "wiping of the feet", asking God to cleanse us of sins and faults and failings, so that we can worship properly. As with many parts of the Mass, the most important moment here is not the words we say, but the silence we are given. This silence is for each one present to "personalise" this moment: it is not a generic acknowledgment of sinfulness, but a deeply personal and intimate confession. We should use this moment to think about the week that has gone, and own up to our great or small sins - the little lacks of patience or understanding, the moments when temper got the better of us, the indulgences we regret, the temptations we did not resist though we knew we should. We should humbly fill our minds with our own sins, things which are our fault, not looking at or blaming others: Pope Francis told a little story about this in an audience two years ago: "It costs us to admit being at fault, but it does us good to confess it sincerely. Confess your own sins. I remember an anecdote that an elderly missionary used to tell, of a woman who went to confession and started speaking about her husband's failings. Then she moved on to talk about her mother-in-law's failings and then the sins of her neighbours. At a certain point, the confessor said to her: "But, madam, tell me: have you finished? — Very well: you have finished with the sins of others. Now start telling your own". Even though this is a penitential moment, it is also joyful, because it celebrates the love of God who desires only that we turn back to him and live! It helps us to become, as Saint Paul says, "the holy people of Jesus Christ, called to take their place among all the saints."
