## **10 January 2021** The Baptism of The Lord

When you live in a coastal town you have a special relationship with water. My earliest memories are of walks to the beach and promenades and gazing, in wonder, at the sea which stretched before me to the far horizon. As a small boy I found a real sense of freedom and peace among the piers and the rocky coastline and would spend hours just exploring and walking close to the water. So, I can respond, quite freely, to Isaiah's call to "Come to the water" but, of course, he is not speaking of sandy beaches, he is speaking of the life-giving water of God which cleanses and refreshes, which calls us and makes us whole. The images that come to me through the words of the prophet are life giving; they are a reminder of the promise of God that by being attentive to Him my soul shall live.

This is especially true when we begin to explore the full meaning of "The Word". Isaiah reminds us that God's Word is always before us, calling us to love all of His creation. He uses the simple image of rain and snow watering the earth, giving life to the seed, and providing a harvest for all. Then we are given a word by Saint John in his first letter. That word is "begotten": what does it mean? Simply it can be described as "fathered by God": suddenly we become part of a greater entity. John is saying that whoever believes in Jesus as Christ becomes a member of the family of God, is loved by God and is called to be His child. How can we attain this status?

John asks us to follow the commandments of God and then we can achieve victory over the world through our faith. We are not alone; we stand with Christ; we have the support, always, of the Holy Spirit and we live in the love of God.

The first step on this way to God is Baptism. Mark, in his straight-talking way, tells of the Baptism of Jesus in one short paragraph; when Jesus is baptised he rises to a new creation; heaven is torn asunder and the Holy Spirit descends on him. His Father then acclaims Him as His Son. We need to find the simple faith of Mark because in doing so, in putting our faith in God, we too become his begotten ones, his children. David Frank

#### Churches to remain open for Mass

With the announcement of a new lockdown for England to curb the rapid spread of COVID-19, Cardinal Vincent Nichols, President of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, said: "The regular practice of our faith in God is a well-established source of both personal resilience and dedicated service to those in need. Such resilience and enduring service are vital in these difficult circumstances. "I am glad that no measures have been introduced that would obstruct or curtail this essential source of energy for the common good. Catholic parishes will continue to serve the needs of their local community. "In one parish, for example, the provision of food for the needy has increased by 400% since March last year." The latest lockdown restrictions come into force on 5 January 2021. In terms of Communal Worship and Life Events, the following guidance is provided: You can leave home to attend or visit a place of worship for communal worship, a funeral or event related to a death, a burial ground or a remembrance garden, or to attend a wedding ceremony. You should follow the guidance on the safe use of places of worship and must not mingle with anyone outside of your household or support bubble when attending a place of worship. Weddings, funerals and religious, belief-based or commemorative events linked to someone's death are all subject to limits on the numbers that can attend, and weddings and civil ceremonies may only take place in exceptional circumstances.

## **GUIDELINES FOR PARISHIONERS WHEN ATTENDING HOLY MASS**

Before you decide to come to church, please read this guidance carefully. The obligation to attend Holy Mass is suspended at this time of pandemic. If you have any symptoms of coronavirus or have been in contact with someone who has symptoms, please stay at home.

- The church will open approximately 30mins before the scheduled Mass time.
- External doors will be open at all times, so wear suitable clothing in case it's cold.
- You must wear a face covering in church. Please bring your own.
- The toilet is closed at all times, except for emergency use.
- As you enter church, a steward will greet you and ask you to sanitise your hands.
- A steward will direct you to an allocated seat. You cannot choose where to sit.

• Social distancing of 2 metres will be observed. Those living in the same household or sharing the same social bubble may sit together.

- Remain in your place once seated and refrain from talking to others.
- Singing during the Mass is not permitted. Mass sheets and books are not available.
- You are not allowed to enter the sacristy area, nor speak to the priest in the sacristy.
- The stewards will have a basket at the back of church for any offerings you wish to give.

• At Holy Communion, please follow the instructions given by the priest and the directions given by the stewards. Wait in your seat before you are asked to move forward.

- After you have received Holy Communion, you can return to your seat in the pews.
- After Mass has ended, the congregation departs in an orderly and distanced manner.
- Sanitise your hands as you exit.
- Refrain from talking and mingling with others outside the church.
