Or you may wish to join the Holy Father in Rome. **Pope Francis's schedule** for the Triduum is expected as follows:

Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday (April 9 at 5pm UK time.)

The Lord's Passion on Good Friday, (April 10, at 5 p.m. UK time) and also Station of the Cross - Via Crucis, at 8pm (UK time).

Easter Vigil on April 11, at 8pm UK time

On Easter Sunday morning, April 12, there will be a Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord, in the basilica, and, at the end of Mass, the Holy Father will impart his blessing "Urbi et Orbi"—to the city of Rome ("Urbi") and to the world ("Orbi"). 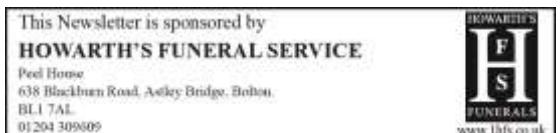

GOOD FRIDAY PRAYER FROM ROME FOR THE PANDEMIC

An additional prayer has been introduced to the Good Friday liturgy. The Solemn Intercessions, which are derived from ancient prayers, are prayed on Good Friday for various categories of people, including the Pope; Bishops, priests and deacons; the faithful; catechumens, other Christians; the Jewish people; those who do not believe in Christ; those who do not believe in God; those in public office; and those in special need. This year a new prayer is titled "For the afflicted in time of pandemic" is set out as follows:

"Let us pray also for all those who suffer the consequences of the current pandemic, that God the Father may grant health to the sick, strength to those who care for them, comfort to families and salvation to all the victims who have died."

After a moment of silent prayer, the priest prays: *"Almighty ever-living God, only support of our human weakness, look with compassion upon the sorrowful condition of your children who suffer because of this pandemic; relieve the pain of the sick, give strength to those who care for them, welcome into your peace those who have died and, throughout this time of tribulation, grant that we may all find comfort in your merciful love. Through Christ our Lord. Amen."*
