Remembering also the key workers who are on the front-line during this current pandemic. We thank them for all they are doing and ask the Lord to keep them safe.


### Hope in the future

The Octave, or eighth day, of Easter has always been considered special by the Church. Christ, after His Resurrection, revealed Himself to His disciples, but Saint Thomas was absent. He declared that he would never believe that Christ had risen from the dead until he could see Him in the flesh and probe Christ's wounds with his own hands - earning him the name "Doubting Thomas."



A week after Christ rose from the dead, He appeared once again to His disciples, and this time Thomas was there. His doubt was vanquished, and he professed His belief in Christ.

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### **DIVINE MERCY**



In 1931, Our Lord appeared to St. Faustina in a vision. She saw Jesus clothed in a white garment with His right hand raised in blessing. His left hand was touching His garment in the area of the Heart, from where two large rays came forth, one red and the other pale. She gazed intently at the Lord in

silence, her soul filled with awe, but also with great joy.

Divine Mercy Sunday is a relatively new addition to the Roman Catholic liturgical calendar. Divine Mercy Sunday is celebrated on the Octave of Easter (the eighth day of Easter; that is, the Sunday after Easter Sunday). Celebrating the Divine Mercy of Jesus Christ, as revealed by Christ Himself to St. Maria Faustina Kowalska, this feast was extended to the entire Catholic Church by Pope John Paul II on April 30, 2000, the day that he canonized Saint Faustina. Christ's Divine Mercy is the love that He has for mankind, despite our sins that separate us from Him.

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## A Sunday Reflection with thanks to David Frank

Acts 2: 42-47, Psalm 117,1 Peter 1: 3-9, John 20: 19-31

The church is going through a period of change and uncertainty as the lockdown continues and people are finding new ways to access services. The use of social media has enabled some to continue with Sunday Mass from home and in some ways has heightened the experience as, through various websites and Facebook pages, we have been able to attend Mass and other liturgies broadcast from many beautiful churches across the UK and Ireland. Unfortunately, those without broadband access and in self-isolation have been unable to take advantage of the services on offer and we somehow need to help those whose need for communication with their faith is unfulfilled. There is an initiative on Local Radio which seeks to plug this gap and, perhaps, this needs to be more widely publicised.

However, we are all missing our Communities and the Eucharist and cannot wait for a return to normal. The question must be asked; How will our experience change us? Will we see a new dawn in our lives? Will the words of Peter ring true – "Your Faith will have been tested and proved like gold"?

In many ways the Early Church must have faced very similar problems to today. During the ministry of Jesus, He must have touched many people's lives but after His death only a very few disciples can have had any knowledge of the growth of a movement in Judaism aimed at continuing the Lord's work. We hear of groups in Jerusalem meeting

together faithfully for prayer and the breaking of bread but how did the word spread throughout Israel and among the people living in other towns and cities throughout the Mediterranean. Just as today, many would be excluded because "they had not heard" the Good News.

In Today's Gospel one of the Apostles suffers from this same lack of information. For some reason Thomas is missing when Jesus makes His first post resurrection appearance to His followers. I often think about Thomas, he is such a remarkable character. His faith is very much in the now. He sees, he believes. He always asks awkward questions. He is the type of enquirer who is great in RCIA sessions because he always wants to know the ins and outs of a subject. I suspect the Lord loved him as well, he is so patient with him. He submits himself to the disbelief of Thomas in a very human way. Look he says, touch me, see the wounds, eat with me, see I am raised from the dead, as I promised, now go and awaken the faith of all you meet.
