Weekly Reflection - the Feast of Corpus Christi

Deuteronomy 8: 2-3, 14-16 Psalm 147 1 Corinthians 10: 16-17 John 6; 51-58

I am the living bread which has come down from heaven



Have you ever been hungry, I mean real hunger, not fasting, just existing without food to sustain you? In our world today there are many without food, they will go to bed hungry, just like they did last night and will do tomorrow night. Each day, for them is a fight for survival, we have seen the scenes from war zones on our television screens of people crowding around aid workers who are distributing food, I read something profound today, a comment that it is not those who are close to the food parcels who have the real hunger, it is the ones on the fringes of the crowd who have not the strength to clamour, to call out, it is the speechless, the one's whose strength has gone that need to be called forward to receive the gift of life.

For that is what food gives, the Gift of Life. That is the message we must take from today. Jesus is the Bread of Life, he gives to all who ask the food that we need to sustain us, to quell our hunger pains, to bring us life with the Father of Love.

Many who listened to the voice of Jesus turned away from Him. They would not accept his Word, They were willing to accept his miracles, the feeding of thousands from five barley loaves and two fish, they looked for his healing touch like the blind man and the lepers, but when He spoke about himself, their doubts came to the surface. Only the apostles stayed true, they recognised the Bread of Life and their answer, when Jesus questioned their commitment, "Lord to whom shall we go" echoes in our hearts as we too believe that Jesus is the Son of God and Our Saviour.

Today we are hungry for a return to normal life, we hunger for the return to the way we lived before this epidemic came along. We miss our community, our Mass, which was always there for us: the availability of the sacraments, the social life our church provided for us. Yet, when it was available, did we really cherish it. Did we make an effort to support those, priests and people, who provided things for us, did we give

thanks, did we hunger for it? Will we welcome the return with open arms, prepared for what changes lie ahead or will we return to the old ways and relax into the easy convenient use of that which our church provides. If something good is to come from our sacrifices then we must take what Jesus is offering, the bread of life, grasp it to our hearts, and begin again in a new way our life in the Body of Christ.

The source and summit of our faith

On the second Sunday after Pentecost, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, also known as the Feast of Corpus Christi, which is Latin for "the body of Christ".

This feast day commemorates the Eucharist, the meal in which we partake of the Body and Blood of Christ. The Eucharist is at the heart of our Catholic faith; and while we do currently have online Mass, we cannot receive this great sacrament during this current climate that traditionally, holds a special place among the sacraments.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church has this to say about the importance of the Eucharist:

1324 The Eucharist is "the source and summit of the Christian life." 134 "The other sacraments, and indeed all ecclesiastical ministries and works of the apostolate, are bound up with the Eucharist and are oriented toward it.

For in the blessed Eucharist is contained the whole spiritual good of

the Church, namely Christ himself, our Pasch."135 The Eucharist was

instituted by Jesus at the Last Supper and this institution of the sacrament is celebrated on Holy Thursday.

Volunteers in readiness for Church re-opening

Please note we need permission from the Bishop and a risk assessment before our own churches can re-open; and when the time comes, we will need people to help as marshals/ushers encouraging people to observe social distancing and ensuring that safeguards are followed, additionally with regular cleaning the church, after each visit.
