

Twenty-Third Week in Ordinary Time



“Where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them”

We all make mistakes, often the mistake is trivial, we hardly notice it but each time we cause a ripple as on a pond and we only see the beginning of that ripple, we seldom see the wave as it reaches the shore. We do not stand alone, each action of ours has an effect on others, forgiveness is not something that we seek alone, sometimes it is others seeking forgiveness from us; do we treat these two requests for forgiveness in the same manner, do we find it easy to seek forgiveness, expect it even, whilst we reserve our forgiveness for those who we think really deserve it. This dilemma is at the base of today's readings.

Ezekiel is called by the Lord to speak to the people about the actions of the sinner. We are one community and each part of that community has a responsibility, for the acts of another part that community. If we stay silent, when an act is committed that causes offence, are we condoning that act? It is up to each of us to see that justice is done; that the culprit is asked to change their ways, to atone for their actions.

Paul argues that by keeping the commandments we are entering into a state of “mutual love” and if everyone takes responsibility for their actions out of love for all members of the community then God's love will surround us and keep us safe for sin. He quotes the commandments that have a direct act on our neighbour, those that damage or even kill our relationships with one another. Loving our neighbour is the greatest single thing we can do for our community.

We want justice but we also want forgiveness; how can we reconcile these two sides of the effects of sin. Jesus, in the Gospel passage, speaks about the conflict between sin and forgiveness. The sinner should be confronted, if he fails to repent then the community must take action. That action must be based on love otherwise the sinner will not change and his sin will remain. Judgement is a terrible responsibility; however, we can be reassured, that if we act together, in the presence of our God, then He will be with us and our actions will be a reflection of His love. *David Frank*

The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary



We know that everyone has a birthday. The Bible doesn't say anything about Mary's birth, but we know that she was born. Like all parents, Mary's parents (Joachim and Ann) probably took one look at their newborn daughter and knew that she was special.

Joachim and Ann loved God very much, and they were filled with gratitude to God for the gift of a child. They raised Mary as a child of God, teaching her to love and serve God. When the angel Gabriel told Mary that she had been chosen to be the Mother of Jesus, she already had great faith in God. Her strong faith and trust allowed her to say yes to God's plan for her. We cannot be certain what the future holds for any newborn infant, but we do know that the life of each person has meaning and purpose. When Mary was born, the world did not know who she was. Sometimes others—and maybe even you—don't see how special you are. Maybe you forget that God is calling you, too, right now, to do what Mary did—to bring Jesus into the world.

When we celebrate his mother's birth, we honour Jesus too. Today thank God for the gift of life, and give honour to both Mary and Jesus by showing respect and concern for one another—remembering that God has created each person with love and with a call to something very special in life.
