Twenty-Fourth Week in Ordinary Time



“Lord, how often must I forgive my brother if he wrongs me”

It all depends, I suppose, on our attitudes. What do we really understand about our lives; is this all there is or is life just a stepping-stone to something greater? If this is all there is then we can live to whatever standards we set ourselves but if there is something greater to come, and I pray there is, then we must consider how we live our present lives and so prepare for eternity.

We believe in a God of love; the life and sacrifice of Our Lord gives us an opportunity to learn and understand from his words and actions so that we may come ever closer to Him and our Heavenly Father. His resurrection gives us the hope that we too will rise again at the appointed time. The Book of Ecclesiasticus speaks of the foul things that are found with the sinner. The advice in the passage is a sober reminder to us that there are many things in this life that we need to avoid if we are to follow Christ. We may view the Ten Commandments as an Old Testament statement that belongs in the past. Jesus did not. He reminds us again and again of their importance to our lives.

Paul recognises the importance of the influence our lives have on others; “If we live, we live for the Lord, if we die, we die for the Lord. He does not put our “church” lives into a different box from the rest of our daily life, he uses the example of the death and resurrection of Our Lord to illustrate that all life, and death comes from Him.

Peter, again, is at the centre of Today's gospel; you can imagine him listening to Jesus, perhaps discussing something with his friends, and then turning to Jesus to seek clarification. It reminds me a little of how we used to approach Confession as children. We could not remember how many times we had “sinned” so we made up a figure hoping it would be accepted (and it always was!). Now Peter guesses at seven, to his amazement Jesus multiplies this seven times to seventy-seven. An enormous number in Peter's eyes. But Jesus is judging forgiveness with the eyes of God; His love is limitless and so is His forgiveness. Until we begin to believe that God's love has no limit, we can only struggle with how we forgive others, and how that power to forgive, is God's great gift to us. *David Frank*

Salford Diocese have been asked to share the following survey, run by the National Office for Vocations in conjunction with other Catholic organisations.

The letter contains two links which will invite the recipient to fill in an online questionnaire regarding the vocation of the older person.
