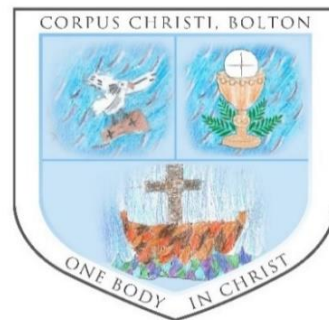

Twenty-Fifth Week in Ordinary Time



**“for my thoughts are not your thoughts,
my ways not your ways”**

Faith in God can come to an individual at any time in his life. Some come to know Him as children and, even after childhood days have gone, that knowing remains. Others find Him at various stages of life; some after many years of searching and others in a sudden conversion which often turns their world upside down. God is always waiting for us; He watches as we grow, and He is waiting for the moment when we turn to Him and speak “Here I am Lord I come to do your will”.

Isaiah was wise in the ways of God. He went through some horrendously, difficult times but he remained faithful. His words come to us as assurance that the Lord will not abandon us; He is always to be found; He is always near. If we change our ways, He is ready with open arms. But we must remember God is God and we are merely mortal. Sometimes we struggle to see Him in the turmoil and the ordinariness of life, His ways are different from our ways and we can only hope that, with the eyes of faith, we can find our way to Him.

Paul rejoiced in knowing that Jesus was Lord; that He gave his life so that we could be saved. Understanding this he came to see that alive or dead he was with the Lord and that by sacrificing his own life in service to Him he would bring glory to His loving Saviour. This was a cause of great uncertainty to Paul; he wanted to be with Christ; but he knew he needed to remain for Christ's sake. His advice to us is simple, but sometimes so difficult, “Avoid anything in your everyday lives that would be unworthy of the gospel of Christ”

The Gospel emphasises the difference between God's way and our way. We can see that those who work all day should receive more than those who only work for an hour. This is the way of the world. It is only fair. However, when the reward is eternal life, how do you differentiate between those who come early to faith in Christ and those who come much later. Is the Kingdom of Heaven based on when we come to know Christ or on when our heart begins to see with the eyes of faith, no matter what the hour? Time is immaterial; it is the knowing and believing that's important. *David Frank*
