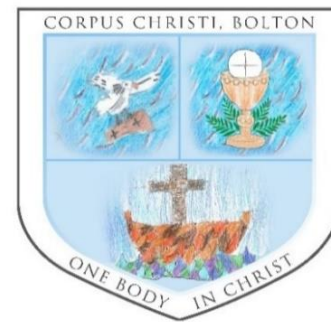

## Twenty-Sixth Week in Ordinary Time



**“There should be no competition, among you,  
no conceit, but everybody should be self-  
effacing”**

There is still time to change. That is the clear message from today's readings. This is the time, in the depths of an unprecedented event the effect of which we cannot yet know, it is surely time for each of us to look at how we live our lives and try to find ways that will take us closer to our loving God. There is no need for rash action or rushing around changing our way of life, it is a time to sit down, relax, think deeply about the way we live and then make some decisions which may or may not change our attitude to our families, our neighbours, our world. We cannot blame God or other people for the way our lives have turned out. Ezekiel speaks out clearly to the people. It is not God's fault if we reject integrity or commit sin, other people cannot force us to sin against our will. We have the power over our lives, we can turn away from sin or we can commit sin. We cannot blame others for our faults. It is up to us; we can choose to die in sin or live in honesty and harmony with others.

The love of self is often the cause of the sin in our lives. From small indiscretions and petty mindfulness, we can gradually fall into sin and these things lead us deeper down that path. Just listen carefully to what Saint Paul has to say. He looks for unity with a common purpose and a common mind. A community in which we live in tenderness and sympathy with one another. This makes us happy, “Always consider the other person to be better than yourself”. Christ is Lord, but He never saw himself as superior to others. He emptied himself so that he could be like us but, much more than that, he accepted death to free us from our sins; and “God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names”. Take Jesus as your model, live by His example, then you will find peace. The parable of the two sons always sounds to me as a tale of two adolescent boys, one wanting to shock his parents, the other seeming to obey but actually going out and doing his own thing. There can be two sides to our characters. We can be willful and nasty, but we can also be obedient and loving. It is our choice; our status in society is no judge; we find love and compassion within the human spirit despite our circumstances. It all depends on the road we choose and the life we live. *David Frank*

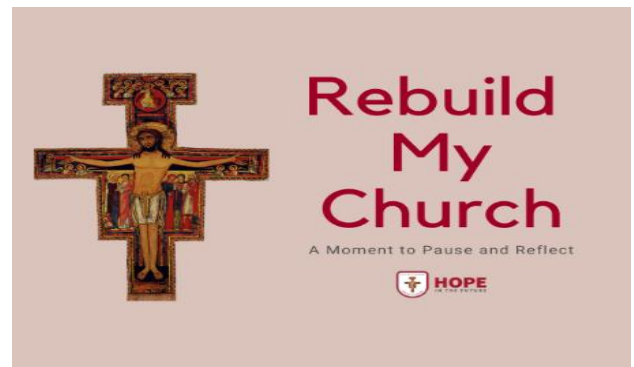
### Offertory Envelopes

### A Message from The Diocese of Salford

In October 2017, we launched our five-year pastoral renewal programme, Hope in the Future. This October, we were due to begin Stage Four - Proclaiming the Good News. None of us could have foreseen the way this year turned out. We have been unable to access the Sacraments, and many families around our diocese have faced ill health, isolation and the loss of loved ones.

Given the strangeness of our present circumstances, we think it necessary to have a period of reflection to discern what we have learnt during these challenging times and, in doing so, plan for a brighter "new normal".

When the time is right, we will relaunch Stage Four of Hope in the Future. But for now, we will take a moment to pause; to remember those we've lost and to reflect on the challenges and opportunities presented by the pandemic

Similarly, our admirable SVP group are trying to comfort and help an increasing number of our own housebound parishioners by regular phone calls (at present) but in normal times by weekly visits to their homes for a welcome chat plus some occasional social events, as funds allow.

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## World Day for Migrants and Refugees

This Sunday is the International Day for Migrants and Refugees. Pope Francis has invited us to consider the theme of *'Forced like Jesus Christ to flee'* reminding us that the Holy Family were also victims of forced displacement.

Refugees to the UK arrive via one of two routes. Either they have been accepted by a Government resettlement scheme and travel directly from another country or they have arrived in the UK and are submitting a claim for asylum. Those who are seeking asylum and can show that they would otherwise be destitute are offered accommodation on no-choice basis and subsistence support of only £5.39 per day but are prohibited from working. If their claim for asylum is recognised as legitimate, newly recognised refugees are given just 28 days 'move-on period' to leave their asylum accommodation. However, this often forces refugees into further destitution, as it can take some time to access mainstream services, such as bank accounts, new housing and income from employment or welfare.

Caritas Salford is responding in a variety of ways, to support those who have been forced to leave their country to escape war, persecution or natural disaster who and are seeking refuge in our area. As well as providing a humanitarian response with food and support through our day centres in Cornerstone, Manchester or Bury, Caritas is a leader in supporting the government Community Sponsorship scheme which enables parish communities to welcome and support a resettled refugee family. We continue to provide free education classes to around 150 people (currently via Zoom) to teach or help improve English language skills and are supporting many learners into higher or further education. We also provide support and advice through 'drop-in' sessions at a variety of locations. Much of this work is funded directly through donations and support of parishes, schools and individuals and we are very grateful for your support.
