One day, by the Sea of Galilee, an itinerant preacher walked the shoreline and called to four young men, sat in their fishing boats, mending their nets, and they immediately got up, went to him, left everything behind them and followed in his footsteps. They did not know where they were going, all they knew was that He knew and that was enough for them. Would you do the same today?

Jesus told the fishermen that the Kingdom of God was very near, that it was not a place, but a state of mind. It was a vision of a world turned upside down and inside out. A world where the poor and needy were the first in this kingdom and the rich and powerful were outside looking in. It was a world where God had opened human hearts and put humanity back inside.

Jonah was a sceptic, he knew the people of Nineveh were hopeless, they were dreadful sinners who could never change. When God sent him there to appeal to them to change their ways and repent, he knew it was a bad idea, he turned and ran as fast as he could in the opposite direction, and it took a near drowning and an encounter with a big fish to get him to change his mind and do what he said he would do in the first place. What did he find? Instead of a hopeless people, he found a people full of hope who were only too willing, from the richest to the poorest, to give up evil ways and repent. They were ready to embrace "the Kingdom of God",

When Paul wrote to the people of Corinth and told them, in no uncertain terms, that spending, feasting, and having fun would lead them to death not life, he too was asking them to change, repent and face up to reality. There are no pockets in shrouds; the kingdom of God is not found in the good life, it is found in caring and forgiving each other, in preparing for a new life, life in the Kingdom of God.

This is why some men and women are looking at the life around them and realising that what they are seeing is not real. They see a world that has become surreal, a world slowly destroying itself by ignoring the destruction of the environment, by making people miserable through the bad news of Social media, a world that was created as a home for humanity that is turning into a nightmare. They have seen clearly

Caritas - Who is my neighbour? *Fr Ged Murphy*: The Parable of the Good Samaritan is a familiar one: a traveller is beaten by robbers, stripped and left for dead by the road. First a holy man and then another comes by, but both avoid the man. Finally, a Samaritan happens upon and helps the injured man, showing great compassion, reflecting the lengths to which love will go. He treats the injured man not as an enemy but as a neighbour, as one of his own. Through this parable, Jesus indicates that a person truly acts as a neighbour through love.

"But who is my neighbour?"

Every gift Caritas receives means we can love and support the most vulnerable and marginalised in our communities. We provide a befriending service for older people, preventing loneliness and isolation. We welcome the stranger, teaching English to those seeking asylum and those with refugee status so they can quickly integrate into their new home community. And we continue to love and feed the hungry, and shelter the homeless, across Greater Manchester and Lancashire. Pope Francis reminds us that, before we are anything else, we are brothers and sisters sharing a common home, and we are called to become neighbours and friends. During the COVID-19 pandemic, we have seen rising inequalities in wealth and new forms of poverty and a disregard for human worth. We have a universal responsibility to act; to accept the obligations we bear to each other, and to find 'fraternal love'. A willingness to respond to human need wherever it is found. In Numbers

384 hampers for individuals and 1181 family hampers. That's 1181 savoy cabbages, 1339 chickens, 1749 blocks of cheese and 2565 selection boxes!

Over **260** different volunteers making the boxes, packing the boxes, stickering, helping on distribution day and delivering! With volunteering facing more barriers and wanting to give everyone an opportunity we were amazed at the response with volunteering being booked up within just a few days.

Over **60** churches, schools, organisations and community groups donated either money or items for the hampers (that isn't including a huge number of individuals who also donated—so many it is hard to keep track). This was the most generosity we have ever seen for the project and included many groups smashing their targets (some by over 1000 of what they expected) and all of our costs covered!
