Words can convey many things, they can hurt, they can heal, they can convince and confuse, mend and break. The ideas they express can create allegiances or cause division; it all depends on who is speaking. Sometimes you can hear someone speak and you can see the truth and authority they possess. Words can build kingdoms or create movements which have the power to change the world in which we live, for better, for worse, forever.

In the Old Testament certain characters so changed the lives of the Jewish people that they became beacons by which ideas gained a certain measure of validity because they were spoken in his name. Moses is a great example of this. The Book of Deuteronomy was written many hundreds of years after his death yet so important was his name that the book was written as if he were the author. Today's passage underlined the need for prophets to speak God's words not their own. The punishment for using God's name, to the prophet's own advancement, was death and to emphasise the gravity of the offence this warning comes in the name of Moses.

So when Jesus spoke in the synagogue in Capernaum, he was very aware of what he was doing. He was standing on Holy Ground and teaching the people sitting before him. He spoke with authority. To an audience who were used to the scribes reading words from the scriptures this was something new and his teaching made a great impression on them. In the midst of his teaching came a voice of dissent, not from the listeners, but from an unclean spirit, yet Jesus had the power to dismiss the spirit and release the man possessed from its power. This caused great consternation from the people gathered in the room, they were astonished at his words and his actions and his reputation spread throughout the countryside.

Mark wrote his Gospel to the Christians of Rome who had survived the persecution of Nero and the loss of the great apostles, Peter and Paul. They needed reassurance that their belief in Jesus would help them in their troubles. Mark assures them, through this passage, that the authority of Jesus is greater than human authority and that He has the power to defeat evil in the world no matter where this evil comes from. Through His word the world is changed, power is no longer solely in the hands of the rulers of this world, it is in God's hands. **David Frank**

On Wednesday we have **the feast of St Blaise**, who was bishop of Sebaste in Armenia in the fourth century. Before being martyred, he is said to have healed a boy who was choking. Since the eighth century, Saint Blaise has been venerated as the patron of those who suffer from diseases of the throat. Usually at the end of Mass on Wednesday we would hold the individual blessing of throats using candles blessed on Candlemas. In light of the pandemic there will be a **general blessing of throats** at the end of 9.30am Mass.

GUIDELINES FOR PARISHIONERS WHEN ATTENDING HOLY MASS

Before you decide to come to church, please read this guidance carefully. The obligation to attend Holy Mass is suspended at this time of pandemic. If you have any symptoms of coronavirus or have been in contact with someone who has symptoms, please stay at home.

- The church will open approximately 30mins before the scheduled Mass time.
- External doors will be open at all times, so wear suitable clothing in case it's cold.
- You must wear a face covering in church. Please bring your own.
- The toilet is closed at all times, except for emergency use.
- As you enter church, a steward will greet you and ask you to sanitise your hands.
- A steward will direct you to an allocated seat. You cannot choose where to sit.

• Social distancing of 2 metres will be observed. Those living in the same household or sharing the same social bubble may sit together.

- Remain in your place once seated and refrain from talking to others.
- Singing during the Mass is not permitted. Mass sheets and books are not available.
- You are not allowed to enter the sacristy area, nor speak to the priest in the sacristy.
- The stewards will have a basket at the back of church for any offerings you wish to give.

• At Holy Communion, please follow the instructions given by the priest and the directions given by the stewards. Wait in your seat before you are asked to move forward.

- After you have received Holy Communion, you can return to your seat in the pews.
- After Mass has ended, the congregation departs in an orderly and distanced manner.
- Sanitise your hands as you exit.
- Refrain from talking and mingling with others outside the church.
