Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord




The readings for Passion Sunday are an introduction to the most important week in our lives. Our Faith is not based on a series of documents or the theological work of learned scholars but on a belief that God exists, that, in His love for us, He sent His Son to live as we live, and that the Son of God died so that we may live, not just for today, but forever. The readings are just words unless, in your heart of hearts, you believe this basic statement of faith. Deep within the meaning of Holy Week is this basic truth and, in the next seven days, we will know once again what it means to be a follower of the Son of God.

Isaiah was writing hundreds of years before the events of Holy Week occurred in historical time. His words, however, echo through the life of the church. Read them carefully for this is an introduction to discipleship, to Christian life. We have a voice, so that we can speak up for those who are less fortunate; we have hearing, so that we can hear the cries of those in pain, in trouble and suffering for their beliefs. When we live as a disciple, we do so knowing; that the power of God is behind our actions and that, whatever comes our way, we are held in His loving arms.

Paul lived as a disciple; he was beaten, stoned, spat at, and left for dead; so he knows the price of discipleship. Through his experiences he can see, clearly, the life and mission of Jesus; and, in today's reading, he gives us a wonderful hymn of faith. The Gospel you will hear today takes us through the events of Holy Thursday and Good Friday; Paul, in this prayer, brings together the essential facts and proclaims that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, who dies that we may be free from sin and have eternal life.

The life of Christ is, in part, a study of the conflict between the different sections of the Jewish people as they try to understand His words and actions. Many fail to make the connection between prophesy and fact. In Mark's Gospel it is left to a Gentile, the Roman Centurion, to speak for us all and proclaim that Jesus is indeed the Son of God. **David Frank**

The drama of this week starts on the Mount of Olives. On Thursday evening we relive the Lord taking bread and wine to be his Body and Blood. Olives, bread, wine, the dying and rising of Jesus.

There can be no olive oil without the crushing of the olives. Bread needs flour but flour cannot be made without the crushing of the wheat. And wine comes forth from the crushed grapes. There can be no Easter without Good Friday. As olives and wheat and grapes, crushed, give rise to something new, so the life of Jesus offered by himself to be crushed as a sacrifice for sin, gives rise, in the Resurrection to new life for Jesus and for ourselves.

It is important that we can plan ahead for where you can sit in accordance with the Government guidelines. The liturgical rites will be simpler this year, so that the duration of the services are not prolonged.

Palm Sunday Masses

As a result of the pandemic our normal Holy Week Liturgy has had to be adapted (more information on back page). This year the Palms will be blessed and then the Gospel will be proclaimed at the beginning of the Mass in the usual manner; the blessed palms will be distributed on your way out of Church by the kind stewards who will be wearing protective gloves. The shorter version of Mark's Passion will be read but the congregation are asked not to join in this year with the part of the crowd as the three readers will also take this part.

Sacrament of Reconciliation

Our Lord Jesus Christ suffered, died, and rose for our salvation- to forgive our sins and to offer us everlasting life in Heaven. Moreover, He wanted His healing ministry of forgiveness for sin to continue through the Sacrament of Penance. On the night of the resurrection, Jesus appeared to the apostles and said, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you.... Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive men's sins, they are forgiven them; if you hold them bound, they are held bound" (John 20:21-23). Currently, it is still difficult to have a Reconciliation service but confession / reconciliation is readily available. Just ask Fr Alf and he will happily oblige

Adaptations to the Triduum 2021 from the Bishops' Conference

Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper

The Washing of the Feet is to be omitted and there will be no procession to the Altar of Repose. The Reserved Sacrament is to be kept in the Tabernacle of the church.

Holy Communion should be given under one kind in accordance of the previous Guidance offered by the Bishops' Conference.

Fr Alf will spend some time in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament in the Tabernacle before exiting the sanctuary.

For reasons of safety, we are not allowed to keep watch with the Lord, therefore once Fr Alf leaves the sanctuary please leave in silence and socially distanced.

Good Friday Passion

The proclamation of the Passion according to St John should be read in a dignified et expeditious manner.

The crowd parts should not be exclaimed by the congregation.

The Universal Prayer will still be carried out.

For the Adoration of the Cross, the Veneration is limited to the celebrant alone. After this, Fr Alf will "invite the people present in a few words to adore the Holy Cross and afterwards, holds the Cross elevated higher for a brief time, for the faithful to adore in silence."

This may be expressed by the faithful through a short period of silent prayer, a gesture such as a genuflection or bow in their places, followed by another short period of silent prayer.

Holy Communion should be given under one kind from the Reserved Sacrament according the previous Guidance offered by the Bishops' Conference.

The Easter Vigil

For the celebration of the Easter Vigil, the Paschal candle should be prepared, enthroned and lit in the Sanctuary before the people gather in the church, or simply lit at the beginning of the celebration.

At the end of the Greeting, the Easter Proclamation (the *Exsultet*) immediately follows, preferably using the Shorter Form. This will be sung by a single voice.

The faithful should not have votive candles for the Easter Vigil.
