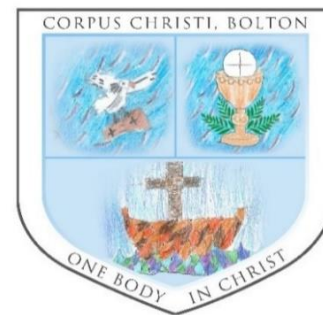

Twenty-First Week in Ordinary Time



Love is at the centre of all that is of value in human relationships; it is the glue that holds us together. It is also the very nature of our relationship with God for, all that is true, all that is beautiful and all that is worthy, is based in love. Love needs commitment. Without commitment when we say we love we are like empty vessels rattling around filled with worthless pebbles. Today's readings examine our attitude to commitment. The passages are very different but the spirit behind the words is the spirit of love. The first reading from the Old Testament is based on choice; the place of the meeting is Shechem. Joshua gathers all the tribes of Israel and their representatives, elders, leaders and judges and scribes. The people are asked to choose between serving God, or turning to the pagan gods of Egypt and the Amorites, they commit to the Lord God of Israel and their journey into the Promised Land continues. Today we have a similar choice; our false gods are all around us in the temptations of the world. We too must choose who to follow and make the same commitment made by the people of Israel all those centuries ago.

The relationship between men and women, between husbands and wives is always based on love. Paul is sometimes criticised for his views on the place of women in the Christian life. This is unfair because we look at the words of Paul through twenty first century eyes and not at the situation when they were written. It is also unfair because Paul acknowledges throughout his letters the great help and service of the women he encounters. The place of women in the world of Paul was very different from today and Paul explains the relationship in this passage from Ephesians. He compares the union of Christ and His Church with the union of man and woman; the spirit behind the words is clear. Christ loves and sustains His church, He is committed to its well-being: marriage is also a loving commitment, and its success depends on mutual love.

Commitment is also the subject of the Gospel passage; the Jews can either choose Christ or turn away. Many cannot accept His words and do turn away. Jesus speaks of the "spirit that gives life". We cannot know the deep mystery of God but by following the spirit that prompts us from within we move ever closer to Him. Peter speaks for those committed to following Christ "Lord, who shall we go to? You have the message of eternal life." Let us pray for the faith of Peter. **David Frank**

Statutory Compliance Work St John's Church

Recently, we have had some surveys carried out at both our church properties to ensure we are up to date with statutory compliance. St Brendan's is currently up to date; however, St John's Church still has a couple of outstanding items:

1. The side doors at St John's Church, did not conform to Fire safety Regulations, and are therefore to be replaced and widened.
2. The large Red Oak (in the front Garden), needs to be removed as it is in a serious state of decay. In line with Laudato Si we will, of course, be replanting a more suitably sized tree in its place. We are also looking into planting some more saplings following the building work of the Patmos Room extension.

The work, for the above, will be carried out over the next few weeks, and if there is to be any disruption to Masses or entry into the church building, we will, of course, let you know.

We would like to thank those who have given their time and effort in sorting the co-ordination of the above and the help with much more as well. God Bless, *Fr Alf*

Taking Liturgy Seriously - Online study course from the Society of Saint Gregory

As part of its commitment to promote and support the liturgy of the Catholic Church, the Society of Saint Gregory will be offering a new modular study course, aimed at developing liturgical understanding. The course, which will be run in partnership with the London Jesuit Centre, starts in September and will take place via Zoom. Held over the course of one year, each module will comprise three sessions and provide a theological and historical overview, which will form the background for a deeper study of how we celebrate the liturgy today. Modules include The Paschal Mystery, Healing and Forgiveness, Initiation, Commitment and Ways of Prayer. Within each theme we will look at how we apply general principles of liturgy, how music and space affect the way we celebrate, and, above all, how we are enabling people to pray together. St John's Church



St John's was founded in 1960, incorporating St Aldhelm's Turton that had been in existence since 1890. That former parish was originally served by the chaplain from Tottington Convent who used to ride over on his horse for Sunday Mass!

Initially St John's used a converted Ministry of Pensions building, where the first Mass was celebrated on 26 August 1961. The current church was opened in 1967. The temporary building continued to be used as a parish hall until the primary school was built in 1977.

This last 18 months, we have missed out so much (as a parish) especially on social events. We will, in the near future, arrange a celebration for the 60th Anniversary of the founding of St John's and the 50th Anniversary of St Brendan's (and we are still in the early stages of "getting back to normal"), it is hoped that we can organize a parish celebration at some point during the next 12 months to commemorate these special anniversaries.
