Twenty-Seventh Week in Ordinary Time



There is much emphasis given these days to vocation. The root of the word "vocation" is voice; vocation is listening to a voice and then acting upon the possibilities the voice offers. The voice may come from within; a sense of following one's inner feelings, or the voice may come from without, through other people, their needs and hopes, their joys and despairs, their dreams for our future.

We each have a vocation in our lives, for most of us it is lived through our families and friends. The Book of Genesis speaks to us today of that very important vocation of the married life. The passage is set in the midst of creation; man fills his days by naming the beasts and the birds, but this fails to provide real companionship, so God sends him into a deep sleep and, from the body of the man, woman is formed. This story is simple, it comes from the inspired imagination of the writer, yet it contains an important message. The truth behind the message is that human life comes from the love between two people and is dignified and sacred. It is not for everyone; the single life is also very important, love can be shared in many ways and is part of the very fabric of society, we each look for companionship and love for without it our lives are unfulfilled.

Vocations are not always smooth and easy; sometimes things go wrong and we question whether this particular choice is what we really want. Married couples fall out of love with each other and turn to divorce as an answer to their difficulties. The passage from Mark's Gospel tells us that the law concerning divorce in the Old Testament was given because the people were "unteachable" but that the basis of that relationship was and always should be that "They are no longer two but one body". Today the pressures of modern living are reflected in the loss of stability in marriage and the subsequent disaster of family breakdown. The church recognises this but sometimes struggles when considering how to care for "wounded families, such as single-parent families or those who are separated or divorced and remarried".

The Gospel focuses us now on little children. Somehow, we need to find a way of creating the spirit of acceptance that we find in children and use that spirit to help us through the difficulties of adult life. David Frank

In today's story of the rich young man, who comes to Jesus full of good intentions, there are some simple words that speak so clearly to our own age: when Jesus tells him to sell everything and give it to the poor, "his face fell at these words, and he went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth." How sad it is that such a keen (he runs up to Jesus), and by all accounts good young man (whom Jesus loves) could not free himself from the one thing that was holding him back; his dependence on money. Jesus' words "How hard it is..." perhaps indicate his own sadness that the young man could not free himself from this. Jesus' teaching was new - as the disciples' reaction shows. In Israel at the time, riches were thought to be a blessing from God. But as Jesus knew and taught, holding on to anything that passes away can distract us from holding on to things that are eternal.
