Twenty-Ninth Sunday of Ordinary Time



'Turning the world upside down' is a familiar phrase and it refers to a total upset of accepted rules and conditions. In a world which places rich important people at the top and the voiceless poor at the bottom it is a revolutionary idea that has far reaching effects on society. The idea that the powerful should be servants of the poor is treated as lunacy by the world in which we live but if we are to follow Christ then that is the reality we must

Isaiah, in his suffering servant poems, speaks of a God who 'has been pleased to crush his servant with suffering'; this is a strange contrast with a God who is love, who is rich in forgiving, but we must accept that it is only through suffering that the mission of Christ can be accomplished for the values of the world will not accept his teaching on the worthiness of every human being. The reward for sacrifice is the promise that "through him the Lord's wishes will be done'; the crushed servant will 'see the light and be content'. We cannot expect fairness in our world; there are many who see riches and power as the only way of life; our ambition should be higher than this.

In Hebrews we are reminded that Jesus took on our human nature to show us that following him was possible even in our weakness and that even he was tempted by the world. We must rely on his grace and mercy to show us the way in which we may follow him.

The Gospel reminds us that even those closest to Jesus were troubled by the temptations of the world. James and John looked for places of power in the kingdom of heaven; they were human and spoke through human ambition. Jesus does not dismiss their request out of hand, but he uses the moment to teach them, and the other apostles, of the consequences of following him. Mark's Gospel was written to people who were suffering from the casual, ruthless violence of a Roman world where power was everything. The fate of many in Mark's community was to follow Christ to a painful death. The life of Our Lord really did turn the world upside down and it continues to do that for if we are to be true to Him then we too must change and become David Frank servants to the poor.
